What is litter?

lit-ter (noun): waste products that are disposed of incorrectly, either deliberately or negligently. It's not just trash, but also tobacco products, toxic substances (oil, chemicals), chemical runoff and illegal dumping

Why is litter such a big deal?

Most obvious — It looks bad, and it is bad for the environment.



- Less obvious It contaminates the ground and water which can kill plants, animals and even humans.
 - It negatively impacts Tennessee's economy, tourism and agriculture (Sales tax revenues which fund our county services are reduced).
 - It takes a lot of time and money to clean up.
 - It doesn't go away on its own. Some trash can take decades or even centuries to decompose.

- There are over 100 million pieces of litter on TDOT rights-of-way at any given time
- From the Great Smoky Mountains to the Mississippi River, and every stretch of roadway in between, litter on Tennessee's 96,167 miles of public roads (4,022 of which are classified as scenic) is more than an eyesore. It's an enormous burden to the state with impacts on public health and safety, the environment, and the economy.
- In addition to being an eyesore, litter on Tennessee's roadways impacts public safety, the economy and the environment, and costs the state more than \$19 Million a year on pickup and prevention.




What's the most common litter item?

- Cigarette butts are the most littered item on earth!
- 4.5 Trillion are littered <u>each year</u>, enough to circle the earth over 2,800 times when placed end-to-end
- Cities spend between \$3-18M annually on cigarette clean-up
- Filters are made of plastic and can take 1-10 yrs. to decompose while leaching toxic elements in the soil and waterways

Carter County Drug Prevention Youths are making a difference in reducing cigarette litter

- Have partnered with Main Street and Keep Carter County Beautiful to rid Downtown and city parks of cigarette butts and more importantly, to encourage businesses to become **nicotine-free establishments**
- · 24 Carter County businesses are currently participating in the program
- Received a grant from Truth Initiative to become trained to provide technical assistance to owners wishing to decrease the use of nicotine around their businesses
- •Two "Sidewalk Butt Cans" have been installed beside of businesses in downtown Elizabethton to reduce cigarette litter on the streets.


There is hope!

In 2020 Eastman took a significant step forward in accelerating the circular economy by starting a chemical recycling technology that will help solve one of the world's most pressing problems – waste plastic.

Eastman's <u>carbon renewal technology</u> breaks down waste plastics into molecular building blocks like carbon, oxygen and hydrogen. Carbon renewal technology is a game-changer for recycling because it provides an end-of-life solution for many plastics from a variety of sources, such as single-use plastics, textiles, and carpet, that traditional mechanical recycling methods cannot process. As a result, many of these plastics are landfilled or incinerated. Eastman expects to use up to 50 million pounds of waste plastic in carbon renewal technology operations in 2020, and projects are currently underway to significantly expand that amount.

What's the punishment for littering?

According to Tennessee Code Annotated (39:14:5)

A person commits littering who knowingly places, drops or throws litter on any public or private property without permission and does not immediately remove it

<u>Amount of Litter</u> < 5 pounds	<u>Fine</u> \$500.00	Additional Service Hours Pick up litter for up to 40 hrs and work up to 8 hrs at a recycling center
5 – 10 pounds	\$500.00	Up to 6 months in jail, pick up litter for up to 80 hrs and work up to 8 hrs at a recycling center
> 10 pounds	\$2,500-4,000	Imprisonment as provided by law
Aggravated criminal littering	\$3,000	One to six years in prison



- It is estimated that 70% of highway litter is due to uncovered loads.
- Tennessee State Law requires: "Any motor vehicle that transports litter or any material likely to fall or be blown off onto
 the highways, shall be required to have such material either in an enclosed space or fully covered by a tarpaulin."
- On May 7, 2021, community leaders came together at the Carter County Landfill to give away free tarps to help citizens obey this law.



Man gets unusual sentence on litter conviction

ELIZABETHTON — A man convicted of littering received an unusual sentence from Carter County Sessions Court Judge Keith Bowers Jr. on Monday.

Instead of ordering jail time, Bowers ordered Chad Joshua Oliver to spend 160 hours picking up trash following his conviction on a charge of aggravated criminal littering. Oliver was also fined \$50 and court costs and placed on probation for 11 months and 29 days.

Lt. Issac Rhea said the incident began on April 10 when he received a complaint about a large amount of garbage dumped on the side of Lick Skillet Road. Rhea said the trash was on the side of the road and also had gotten into a creek.

Another Teaberry Road littering case was again before Carter County General Sessions Court Judge Keith Bowers on Monday.

According to the docket, Kenneth Phillip Poore and Curtis Hitechew are charged with criminal littering after being caught on video dumping a mattress by Roan Mountain resident Elizabeth Woodby on Teaberry Road located in the Roan Mountain community.

Woodby posted the illegal dumping on Facebook before swearing out an affidavit in General Sessions Court which resulted in summonses being issued to the two men for criminal littering.

Judge Bowers denied appointed counsel to both men because the court determined they had adequate resources to hire private counsel.

Fair warning by the courts: Trashing the litter bugs

What in sandhill is going on in Carter County?

We're talking trash. And, it sounds like that citizens in Carter County have had enough and are working to bring this problem to a screeching halt.

It's a message that has been sent by not only individuals, but by law enforcement officers and the court, that if you trash our roadsides, you are going to pay.

This month, alone, three persons have been bound over to the grand jury for littering. Two of the three individuals were caught by a citizen dumping unwanted trash off the side of Teaberry Road in Roan Mountain. A third allegedly dumped dead animals on the same road.

Chancellor John Rambo found a man in civil contempt after he failed to clean his property in the 30-day allotted period given by the court. The man was ordered by the court to be taken to jail and furloughed Monday through Friday from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. to clean his property to comply with the court's order.
